

NOTE-TAKING AND LECTURE RECORDING



Peer note-taking assistance is typically provided when lectures are not recorded. Some professors choose to record their lectures and either share them through a learning platform or provide the recordings directly to our office for students with approved accommodations. It is the professor's decision whether to record and share their lectures with students. If your professor is recording and sharing their lectures, either through a learning platform or directly, it will remove the need for a note-taker for these reasons:

- **Access to Complete Information:** Recorded lectures give you the full class content, allowing you to revisit it whenever you need. This ensures you do not miss any important details that might be missed in traditional note-taking.
- **Flexibility:** You can pause, rewind, and review the lecture at your own pace. This allows you to take notes or absorb the material in a way that works best for your learning style.
- **Comprehensive Understanding:** Recorded lectures may include not only what is spoken but also visual aids, demonstrations, or class interactions, giving you full access to the learning experience.
- **Self-Sufficiency:** With the material readily available, you can rely more on the recordings for studying, helping you become more independent in your learning instead of depending on someone else's notes.
